First Lutheran Church – Hibbing is a parish of the Northeastern Minnesota Synod, one of 65 synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The ELCA is one of the largest Christian denominations in the United States, with nearly 3.3 million members in more than 8,900 worshiping communities across the 50 states and in the Caribbean region.

This same question is posted every week on the ELCA Facebook page: "Where have you seen God at work this week?" Only a few people ever respond, and they usually answer by describing some chance encounter with a distant friend or family member, a random act of kindness, a touching moment in the liturgy, or some other example of coincidence or serendipity.

But if we're looking for God at work in the world we don't need to look for some rare alignment of the stars or an incident of unexpected generosity. God is at work in everything, everywhere, and in every moment — in the very subconscious acts of our breathing and blinking, in the gravity that holds us to this earth and that keeps this planet spinning around the sun. This is why in the preface of the eucharistic prayer we say: "It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should — at all times and in all places — offer thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ . . ."

I have never responded to the Facebook question, but whenever I see: "Where have you seen God at work this week?" I find myself asking this instead: "Where has God seen YOU at work this week?"

We're too often searching for God "out there," and looking for proof of God's existence, or involvement, or care and concern for us ... but I think we need to consider the reverse and look at our own involvement, care and concern for others in this world. It seems to me that that is what Jesus did. He consistently pointed out how God is at work in the world through us — through ordinary people doing ordinary things. That's what makes an extraordinary difference in the lives of the people around us.

Consider how a parent cares for their children. It's not in the occasional big acts of compassion or generosity; it's in the often monotonous tasks that we do on repeat: preparing meals, changing diapers, rocking them until they calm down, singing till they fall asleep. When we're only looking for God to act in the big and bold moves on the world stage, or in those random acts of coincidence or kindness, we might miss where God is already at work among us — right here, in and through us. God is revealed in that mother, preparing the meal; God is coming to us through that father, changing the diaper; God is at work in that child, giving us the opportunity to practice our patience, offer our gifts, and to show our love.

As we begin the new year, I've been thinking about how we will see God at work in our church and in our lives and where God will see US at work in the church and in the lives of others. And I thought of Saint Teresa of Avila (1515–1582). Teresa was born in Spain and entered a Carmelite convent when she was eighteen years old, and later earned a reputation as a mystic, reformer, and a writer. She founded a convent, and wrote a book called The Way of Perfection for her nuns which includes this poem: Christ Has No Body.

Christ has no body but yours; no hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks with compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good. Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are his body. Christ has no body now but yours; no hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks with compassion on this world. Christ has no body now on earth but yours.

A good reminder as we begin another year with our best intentions: that God wants to be at work in the world, and God wants to use the church — you and me — to do that work.

Lent

Lent begins on February 14 — Valentine's Day — this year. Spend some of that special day with the people you love here at First Lutheran Church. We will begin the Lenten season with an 11:0 am Ash Wednesday liturgy followed by a chili lunch and the traditional Chili Cook-off at 5:00 pm. Following evening worship, we gather in the Sanctuary for the solemn Liturgy of the Word with the Imposition of Ashes. This day's liturgies call us to intensify our commitment to Christian discipleship through acts of sacrificial giving, selfcontrol, and prayer.

Lenten Midweek Soup Lunches and Worship — Mid-morning Edition

Join us for an 11:00 am brief Lenten service followed by a light lunch of soup, bread, and dessert. Each week we will begin our time together in worship and end with food and fellowship. This is for anyone and everyone, but especially for those who don't drive at night or for whom an evening out is not possible for whatever reason. All are welcome to attend — but as we begin to offer this event, it would be helpful if you could express your intent to participate by signing up at the Welcome Table or calling the office to let us know so we can get a feel for how many to expect for the meal.

Lenten Midweek Soup Suppers and Worship — Evening Edition

Each week during the Lenten season we will be holding the traditional Midweek Lenten Soup Suppers and Services. The meal begins at 5:00 pm — chili, soup, or something good along with bread and usually desserts because we can't help ourselves. At 6:00 pm, a half-hour worship begins in the sanctuary. If you would be willing to make or provide a soup, bread/ crackers, or dessert please sign-up at the Welcome Table.

Spaghetti Meal

On Wednesday, March 6, we will be having a Spaghetti Meal youth fundraiser and we hope you'll all come out for that to support our young people! We'll have spaghetti with meatballs, bread, and salad available at both the mid-morning and evening events.

Safety Policy

Years ago, First Lutheran Church was one of the first churches in our synod to develop a "risk management" policy as they were termed then — a safety policy that helps the church be an intentionally safe place for our staff and volunteers, members, and visitors. It was focused on maintaining healthy boundaries for all people, especially around children and vulnerable adults. We are in the process of updating that policy. You may have read about "disruptive people" in the council minutes, and that's in part what this was about. Soon you will be hearing about our updated policy that addresses the need to make our building more secure on Sunday morning when members of the community have access to our building, which we also need to maintain as a safe place for those worshiping here and for the Sunday School and Confirmation students who enjoy the building. This will include new directions for ushers, and a request for all parents/ grandparents to keep watch over their own children outside of classroom or event settings where a teacher is actively present. The main difference you will see in the near future is the locking of the south alley door (nearest the fellowship hall/ Sunday School classrooms) once worship has begun, leaving the only unlocked access to the building on Sundays at the main doors and the tower where the ushers can be more aware of who is entering/ leaving.
