

First Lutheran Church – Hibbing is a parish of the Northeastern Minnesota Synod, one of 65 synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The ELCA is one of the largest Christian denominations in the United States, with nearly 3.3 million members in more than 8,900 worshiping communities across the 50 states and in the Caribbean region.



# **Pastor**

I was listening to a book on Audible the other day where the author made this realization. He was around 30 years-old at the time, and he said he was reading about 30 books in an average year. And it struck him one day as he stood in a bookstore that if he continued at that rate (which I thought was pretty impressive!) and he lived for another 50 years, he only had 1,500 more books left to read in his lifetime.

At first, 1,500 books seems like a lot – but not when you consider how many books there are out there, and of those how many you want to actually read. He realized that instead of trying to read as many as he possibly could, he had to become much more selective about what he chose to read from here on out.

He also put it into another perspective when he compared how much time he spends reading with the amount of time he wastes on watching trash TV on Netflix or "doom scrolling" through Facebook and the other social media we're all tethered to.

So, he is going to limit his screen time, cut down or off is social media, and become

much more selective about what he reads with the reading time he has left. He wants to have a more meaningful life, filled with the good stuff – not just stuff.

This got me thinking. I have written a lot of sermons in my life. I think if I added it all up -21 years of Ordination, 52 Sundays per year, plus Lenten midweeks and other holy days - not counting funerals and weddings, and taking off four Sundays of vacation a year . . . we're somewhere north of one thousand sermons.

When I did that math, I was kind of surprised it wasn't more, but it was no less distressing. Because of those 1,000 plus sermons I really can't remember any of them. That doesn't mean they were bad, though some doubtlessly were. A few may have even been really good, but just a couple of days or weeks later, they're just another 1,000-1,200 words taking up space in my computer's memory.


Just because they weren't all that remarkable, it doesn't mean they weren't useful. Like the man who realized he couldn't really recall one of the thousands of meals he had eaten in his life as being that outstandingly delicious, but also understood that it didn't mean that all of those ordinary meals didn't keep him alive. They did the important work they were meant to do, even if they weren't memorable.

There is one sermon I keep going back to, and not surprisingly, it isn't one I wrote. For years I have been drawn to read and re-read Jesus' sermon from Matthew chapters 5 through 7. We call it "The Sermon on the Mount," though I'm certain Jesus never did. Jesus' sermon has become not just my scriptural inspiration to

live out the values of the kingdom of God, but it has also become a very good mirror, reflecting back to me the ways I have completely misunderstood or disregarded those values.

More than anything, I have found in these teachings of Jesus the call to follow him more intentionally, not as a practice of religion, but as a deepening of spirituality; not

as a way to merit my salvation or to earn God's love, but as a way to live out my salvation as one of God's beloved children.



I won't say it has changed me completely, but each day I find that giving my attention to Jesus' words in this most memorable sermon changes how I see the world around me, how I choose to interact with my neighbors, how I understand myself and how I relate to God.

This Fall, we'll be taking a detour from the Revised Common Lectionary and looking at the Sermon on the Mount together, verse by verse, chapter by chapter. If you'd like to go deeper, read the sermon ahead – you can find it in the gospel of Matthew 5-7. You can also join us on Tuesdays for Lunch & learn where we'll give more time and attention to the themes of the Sermon on the Mount.

### **Service of Holy Communion**

Sundays at 9:30 am

Join us every Sunday for worship. We gather around the means of God's grace — the Word and Sacrament — every Sunday at 9:30 am. Doors are open by 8:30 am. Gathering for worship is at the heart of Lutherans identity. If you can't be with us in person, make sure to watch on Hibbing Public Access or YouTube (information on the front cover).

### Volunteers and Ministers of the Liturgy

Every Sunday we gather for worship, you might notice that there are a lot of people who make it happen. Would you like to be one of them? Readers proclaim the reading and psalm. Assisting Ministers help distribute the Holy Communion. The Altar Guild sets up for and cleans up after the Communion. Ushers and Greeters welcome people into the sanctuary with a smile and a worship bulletin, and let them know when to go up for Communion. Altar Servers (usually kids, but they don't have to be) light the candles and carry the cross in and out of the sanctuary. Audio-Visual makes sure our services are broadcast on HPAT and YouTube. Fellowship Hosts make sure we all have coffee following worship. If you'd like to get involved in any of these ministries, please sign up and if you need help or encouragement, talk to the pastor.

#### Fall Lunch & Learn


September 12

This year, we will offer two options for Confirmation classes — a Sunday morning and a Wednesday evening format. Families will need to choose which format will work for them. Our first classes of the year will be held on Sunday, September 17 from 10:30-11:30 am, and on Wednesday, September 20 from 6:00-7:00 pm. Classes will meet in the third floor classroom.

# **Building and Grounds Updates**

This late Summer and early Fall, you will be seeing quite a bit of work being done here at First Lutheran Church. Our council and property committee members have been working with local companies at getting some important projects taken care of. Range Cornice will be installing a new metal roof over the sanctuary, and re-building the gutters. This work, which will cost around \$80,000, could start at any time. Another major project, with an \$89,000 bid just approved, is the replacement of windows and panels on the West side of the office building. Believe it or not, the office addition is about 75 years old, with original windows throughout. Through those windows we experience major heat loss in the cold months, and extreme heat in the summer. We are also working with HPU and Iron Range Plumbing on developing a new plan for a more efficient heating system; more information on that should be available soon. Other work includes replacing all the building's door locks, painting some of the exterior of the Fellowship Hall/ Sunday School addition, and repairing water damage to the plaster work in the sanctuary. There are also replacements coming for some of the parsonage windows this Fall. We are grateful for major donations that are helping with all of this necessary upkeep of the building. And we thank you for your continued financial support of First Lutheran Church, and for any contribution you might be able to make the Building Fund. Through your generosity we are able to tend to one of our great assets as a faith community this beautiful and historic building in the heart of Hibbing.

These funds make going to camp and attending youth trips possible for the kids in our parish.
